THE TRENTON WATERFRONT DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

Masonic Temple, Front & Barrack Streets

The history books tend to focus on the military engagements of the American Revolution, which in Trenton's case was the two battles fought on December 26, 1776 and January 2, 1777. The Revolutionary War, however, took a heavy toll on the area immediately surrounding the town, especially along the waterfront in the weeks leading up to the battles. Later on in the war, up until 1779, Trenton's port community of Lambertown played an important role in the Continental Army's supply network and then in 1781 the town and its port played host to French and American troops moving south to Yorktown, returning northward a year later. Making use of archival research, maps and archaeological discoveries, Dr. Richard Hunter, Principal of the Trenton-based consulting firm Hunter Research, Inc., will discuss events that occurred along on the Trenton waterfront during the Revolutionary War.

2ND BATTLE OF TRENTON

First Presbyterian Church, 120 East State Street

Reenactment begins at the First Presbyterian Church. After a commemorative ceremony at First Presbyterian Church, the battle commences on East State Street, moving south on Broad Street to Lafayette Street and proceeds to the field adjacent to the Old Barracks Museum on Barrack Street where the scene of much of the action for the Old Barracks-orchestrated reenactment of the Second Battle of Trenton transpires. Three times British General Charles Cornwallis ordered his men to take control of the Assunpink Creek Bridge, and three times they failed. Soon after, the American troops escaped by back roads toward Princeton. Years later, Cornwallis conceded that he lost the war when Washington gave him the slip in Trenton.

DIRECTIONS

FROM NORTH:

From I-95 to Rt. 29 South to Calhoun Street exit. At end of ramp, make a right at the traffic light onto West State Street. Make the first right onto Barrack Street. The Old Barracks Museum is on the right. At the traffic light just past the Barracks, make a left onto Lafayette St. At the next light (S. Warren St.), turn right. The Marriott Garage will be on your right. Tell the guard you are attending an event for Patriot's Week.

From NJ Turnpike to exit 7A (Trenton/Shore Points). Rt. 195 West to Rt. 29 North, going through tunnel and exiting at Calhoun Street. Follow directions above.

From Route 1 take Perry Street exit. Go left at top of ramp. Perry Street becomes Bank Street. Take left on North Willow Street. North Willow becomes Barrack Street. Follow directions above.

FROM EAST:

From I-295 (Exit 60) or I-195 West: 195 West becomes Rt. 29 North. Follow signs for 29 North, going through tunnel and exiting at Calhoun Street. Follow directions above.

FROM SOUTH:

From N.J. Turnpike to Exit 7A (Trenton/Shore Points). Rt. 195 West to Rt. 29 North. Follow directions per above. From Rt. 295 (Exit 60) or Rt. 130 to Rt. 195 West. Rt. 195 becomes Rt. 29 North. Follow signs for 29 North, going through tunnel and exiting at Calhoun Street. Follow directions above.

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
